ACEs Aware initiative

ACEs and toxic stress represent a public health crisis that has been, until recently, largely unrecognized by our health care system and society. The good news is that research has shown that there are many ways to prevent ACEs, reduce and heal from toxic stress, and build healthy, resilient communities. Screening for ACEs, assessing for toxic stress, and responding with evidence-based interventions, can significantly improve the health and well-being of individuals and families.

California's Surgeon General, Dr. Nadine Burke Harris, has set a bold goal to cut Adverse Childhood Experiences in half in one generation. To achieve this, Dr. Burke Harris and Dr. Karen Mark, Medical Director of the Department of Health Care Services, are leading the ACEs Aware initiative as part of Governor Newsom's California for All initiative. ACEs Aware provides training and payment to Medi-Cal providers for ACEs screening, and trains providers and networks of care to respond with evidence-based interventions and trauma-informed care.

In June 2020, ACEs Aware awarded grants to **100** organizations to expand the reach and impact of the ACEs Aware initiative. Two grants were awarded to organizations that operate in Santa Cruz County.
